FACELIFT FOR THE ANNE VAN ZYL ART CENTRE

After more than six months of renovations, the Anne van Zyl Art Centre has reopened, to the great excitement of art students and teachers alike. Mrs Greenberg gave Snippets reporter, Teagan Hawkes, a guided tour of the new facilities...

One enters the Art Centre through a new archway, which will soon be adorned with a sign proclaiming its name: The Anne van Zyl Art Centre. To the left is a 'green wall' - trees have been planted inside a wire cage. As they grow, they will be pruned to take the shape of the metal structure. Straight ahead is a fountain flowing into a rectangular reflection pond, which looks beautiful at night.

The classroom ceilings have been lifted, and high windows installed to let in more southern light. The rickety old wooden doors have been replaced with sliding glass doors. The desks and chairs have been sanded down and some new desks were bought. The floor in Mrs de Villiers' classroom has been fixed

and she now has a big storeroom and an office. Some new furniture has been bought and will soon be installed.

An entire sculpture studio has been built onto the existing buildings. A beautiful woodwork bench has been installed, and the studio has been designed so that the floor can be washed with ease - a tap on the wall can be switched on and waste on the floor can be swept into drains that are built into the floor. A giant-sized basin has been installed for soaking sculpture moulds. Girls will have the opportunity to learn to weld and braze.

A new library has been added, which is filled with beautiful art books. The audio-visual room has been upgraded with several computer stations where girls can research. The dark room is currently being set up and the photographers will soon be able to develop their own film and print their own black and white photographs.

The lockers that used to stand in the classrooms have all been moved into a new locker room. The printing studio has been enlarged and it is now much bigger and more accessible with loads of cupboard space.

The ceiling of the pottery studio has been fixed and the walls were raised to provide better sound proofing (making pots is a very noisy process!). In the kiln room, (which is out of bounds to students) there are ovens for firing the pottery and there's now even a glass kiln, so students can do glass work.

A gas line has been laid down in the jewellery studio, so it is no longer necessary to use gas bottles. Unfortunately, there's a bit of a problem getting oxygen at the moment, with all the oxygen being kept for COVID patients. The benches have been raised so everyone can sit up straight as they work. An extra mill was bought, as well as extra drills, so girls won't have to wait in long queues to use the equipment.

At the West end of the Art Centre, next to Mrs van Niekerk's classroom, there is a newly planted garden where girls will be able to paint and where open-air art exhibitions will be held

Although there is still quite a lot of unpacking to do, all the staff and art students are already loving the fancy new Bauhaus-style facilities and are feeling very lucky to have it all. Everyone is very excited and happy to be back in the Art Centre and they are hoping to produce many good works!

TIME FOR DELF

Mrs Bakam, Head of the French Department and part of Alliance Française, has started training the senior French learners for their various Delf Examinations in October. This is the first time that the fifteen- hour training is happening at PHSG.


The Delf Examination has four levels: A1, A2, B1 and B2. On completion of any one of the four levels, students will receive an internationally-recognised diploma that will enhance students' curricula vitae and benefit them in their chosen professional careers.

Students preparing for the A1 exam need to be able to understand and use simple everyday expressions. They need to be able to deliver a fluent introduction and should have the ability to interpret and interact in easy conversation, provided that the other person speaks slow and clearly. The A2 students should be comfortable understanding everyday expressions related to information about their family, employment and the surrounding areas. They need to be able to provide simple descriptions of the above topics.

The B1 diploma tests participants' abilities include comprehending matters relating to leisure, school and work. Students need to be able to describe their experiences, such as dreams and ambitions. The B2, the highest level of the Delf, expects learners to have the ability to understand the main points of a complex text. They should be fluent and confident in starting a conversation with native speakers. And, lastly, they need to be able to explain their points of view regarding a particular topic.

This educational opportunity will help to increase the

chances of employment for those who have participated. The skills they master will benefit them in the classroom and in the near future.

CHANGING A CULTURE FROM THE INSIDE OUT

Rape Culture is a culture in which sexual violence is normalized in a society and victims are blamed for the actions of the perpetrator. South Africa has the highest number of rape cases in the world. The question is, how can we end this culture?

"If you want to change the culture, first change the art". These wise words by Alicia Carrol suggest that culture is multi-dimensional which means many elements need to be considered to bring about any significant change. Rape culture is subtle and it takes place in many forms, such as victim blaming, language that trivialises rape, jokes about rape, sexual objectification in advertisements, images that praise sexual violence and song lyrics that promote sexual violence without consent.

The most common element is victim blaming. The social narratives surrounding rape causes victim blaming, deflecting accountability away from the perpetrator. Survivors go through mental, emotional, and physiological trauma and victim blaming only makes things worse.

Boys can also be victims of rape and sexual assault. For a male victim, the social paradigm surrounding rape brings more challenges because males are expected to conform to hyper masculine traits. Gender roles often dissuade males from reporting sexual assault.

We all have a role in ending rape culture.

We can start by teaching people what consent is. No means NO! We can have open discussions with people about rape culture, believe survivors and, most importantly, hold perpetrators accountable for their actions. We can all make a difference if we work together.

FEMMENGINEERING

Over the July holidays, a PHSG team participated in the semifinals of the Modiragatsi Innovation Competition hosted by the Engineering Faculty of North-West University. The team consisted of Dimpho Sefora (12 Duncan), Kaashifa Saloojee, (12 Van Zyl) and their mentor, Mr Ronald Prigge (Head of Sciences).

The Modiragatsi Innovation Competition is aimed at promoting women within STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) and encouraging girls to pursue careers within these fields, which are generally maledominated. The competition required the team to create and develop a solution to a problem within the community based on five categories: food, energy and water, genderbased violence prevention, healthcare and mental health, nature conservation and tourism, and township economy.

The PHSG team chose to focus on mental health. The idea was to create an app to assist people living with mental health issues and to provide them with real-time help. "This is a topic that we care strongly about," says Kaashifa Saloojee, "and in today's society, we feel it is incredibly important to help and support people, living with mental health issues, to be able to live their lives as comfortably as possible, without judgement or stigmatisation."

In the initial round of the competition, the team had to

submit a presentation of their idea to be reviewed by the judges. From there they advanced to the semifinals, which took place from 12 to 23 July. During this time, the team participated in various courses to give them the skills they needed to explore their idea fully, such as design thinking, computational thinking, UX design and mobile app development, as well as understanding the complexities of

At the end of the programme, the teams submitted their final presentations and reports of their ideas. From these submissions, five finalists were chosen from each category, and the overall winner was announced on 9 August at NWU's "Femmengineering" event. The PHSG team made it to the top 5 of their category, Healthcare and

The PHSG girls have shown that women are just as capable in the areas of creativity, innovation and problem-solving as men. This is an important message, especially during Women's Month, and shows that women should not be restricted or restrict themselves to stereotypical roles - each woman should be allowed to follow her passion.




PHSG Grade 10 Drama students treated the Grade 2s at Brooklyn Primary to a show about friendship.

The hampers are valued at about R550 each and contained blankets, gloves, socks, scarves, beanies, face cloths, soap,


